NMTA Round 2
San Ysidro, NM March 1, 2009

Perfect weather helped make the weekend terrific at San Ysidro as February ended and March began, and the New Mexico Trials Association held its second event of the season. Numerous lucky RVers started the fun and festivities Friday, maximizing their time with friends and family. Many others arrived Saturday, and riders started inspecting the sections that awaited them on Sunday's competition. With the inspection came fretting and speculation, as competitors worried about the obstacles and tight turns awaiting them. The second TY80 "Buffoonery" Competition was held Saturday afternoon (see Chris's write-up), followed by campfire stories (lies?) and marshmallow consumption that evening.

Sunday was the day of truth. Worries from the previous day concerning the difficulty or relative ease of some sections kept riders talking about moving up or down—now was the time to select a class to ride. Sign-up ran long again, as 85 entrants filed through the line, including riders from Canada, Wyoming, Arizona, and Colorado. Everyone should appreciate that our sport is healthy and vibrant.

After the long sign-up, the Lower Class rider meeting was held about 9:10, with bikes firing up around 9:15. Section One was within sight of the Pit Area, with Sections Two through Eight lying in Amateur Canyon. One was a deceiving dirt embankment, dropping into a creek bed, climbing out once for Beginner and Novice, while requiring an extra climb and descent for Amateurs and Intermediates. Bob Micket reports that many competitors took it for granted, only to be disappointed with dabs or sometimes complete failure—the dreaded five.

The loop from One headed toward the top of Amateur Canyon for Sections Two and Three. Two had a small water hazard for Amateurs as they crossed a small rut. Three provided Intermediates many choices on a rocky climb out of the section, or a sneaky line where the Amateurs went. Section Four had Amateurs dropping into a sand and rubble hazard, before the hard right-hand turn to the exit; this was harder to ride than the Intermediate line, except for the downhill gap the Intermediates had to traverse.

Riders were off the caprock for Section Five, which forced Intermediates and Amateurs to navigate a tight 270-degree left-hand turn. Novice and Beginner found the sandy rubble incline challenging in the middle of the section.

Sections Six, Seven, and Eight were at the bottom of Amateur Canyon. Section Six spooked the Novices on the ratty downhill right-hander toward the exit, and Intermediates had a nearly impossible turn around a bush, with sand adding to the frustration. Eight had a cambered right-hand off to challenge Intermediates as they dropped into the flat bottom exit with boulders blocking the path—which all classes had to work around.

Bottlenecks throughout the morning had many riders missing the 12:00 target, so the Morning Class ran past the noon goal. The afternoon riders were given until 1:30 to get ready, allowing time for the Juniors to ride over lunch.

The afternoon loop was In Lower Pool, with Section One near the pits. It was a tightly-ribboned precursor, setting the tone for the afternoon. Sportsman, Semi-Expert, and Expert had a double-step ledge, with Champs having the option of hopping in a small nook to set up for an awkward rock, or attacking it with a splatter or zap. Most seemed to opt for the attack.

Semi-Expert dreaded the tight turn and short run at the double step climb in Section Two. Champs and Experts crossed numerous deep gaps, and went up and down a series of ledges. Sportsman had a choice of dropping into the sand, or taking the high line and using the steep Semi-Expert drop into the sandy bottom.

Section Three was about half-way down Lower Pool. It had Sportsman and Semi mounting a slab to the right, with Sportsman dropping off the other side. Expert got onto the slab where it was undercut, making an immediate left over a pile of smaller slabs. Sportsman had an easy down through the sand, and a left-hand turn, then up and out. Other classes had a choice of dropping off a three-foot ledge or finding a line over ruts and gaps.

Section Four had Experts going up an undercut rock with a six-inch surface floating about thirty inches off the ground. Champs had the same small target for a zap, but with a much tighter set up.

Section Five had the appearance of being on flat ground, but smooth-edged gaps and ruts tested traction skills, particularly for the Sportsman class.

Maintenance Shack

Greetings everyone! This month's Shack was suggested by our own Pappy Hassler. I thought it was a fine idea, so let's get started shall we?

In addition to the usual maintenance chores our machines require, there is some once-a-year items that are a good idea to perform during the "off" season. Now I know that our break is over, but these items can be performed any time, not just in the winter. These are somewhat involved, so if you are not confident in your abilities, by all means seek help from either your buddies or hire a professional to do it for you.

Since smooth suspension action is so critical in our sport, a couple of simple maintenance procedures ensure fun riding and less possibility of frustrating failures later in the season. Changing fork oil yearly not only keeps fork action smooth, but also reduces the possibility of leaky seals later. Follow the manufacturer's recommendations for fork fluid flushing and re-filling. I prefer to fill the forks to a specified level (per manufacturer specs) rather than just pour in the recommended amount. The "amount" method works OK, I'm just finicky. Setting the level is as easy as shining a light down the fork and measuring the level with an accurate measuring device (dial calipers with a depth rod, steel rule, etc.). Perform this measurement with the fork cap off (of course), the spring out and the fork compressed. Bikes with springs in one fork only share the same procedure. Just set the "damper" fork the same way. I utilize a special tool consisting of a large syringe, plastic tubing connected to a small steel tube with millimeter markings engraved on the outside and a "stopper" ring. I set the ring to the recommended fork level (measured from the top of the fork tube), pour in the fluid and use the syringe to draw fluid down to the pre-set level. Quick and easy. Re-assemble and enjoy.

Let's not neglect the rear suspension. Now is an excellent time to disassemble the shock linkage (if your bike has such) and clean and pack all the bearings/bushings with grease. As I've stated before, a good WATERPROOF grease is highly recommended here. Don't forget to also grease the shock pivot eyelets, and a thin layer of grease on the shock mount bolts

prevents corrosion (and grief) later. Anti-seize on the threads also makes life easier later.

With the bike on the bench (or stand, whatever), now is a good time to take a peek at the spokes, check the steering head bearings for proper adjustment, check for smooth throttle action, and check tightness of bolts, nuts, and fasteners. Anything questionable? Disassemble, clean, lube, repair, and re-assemble! A little time spent on these items now sure beats repairing the same in the pits before (or worse, during) an event, or worse explaining an embarrassing failure to your snickering buddies.

Sections Six, Seven, and Eight were closely grouped at the bottom of Lower Pool, and seemed to have the heaviest spectator traffic of the day. Cameras abounded as people snapped pictures of riders on big ups and deep crevasses. Section Six had the six-foot wall for Champs, with the downhill approach and short run making it difficult. Champs were allowed to reset a kicker as needed. Experts turned before the wall, climbing a series of rocks, then climbing a dirt hill behind the wall. Semi-Expert and Sportsman climbed the same hill, then had a tight right-handed turn, while avoiding falling into the three-foot deep sandy crevasse.

Sections Seven and Eight had the riders in and out of the sand, and up rock ledges, offering plenty of action and challenge. The afternoon unfolded smoothly, and all riders finished their three loops with about forty minutes to spare.

The TY80 Chronicles

New Mexico State TY80 championship round two.

Saturday afternoon, February 28th saw the second round of the New Mexico State TY80 championship take place at the parking lot at San Ysidro. Four sections greeted the riders this round, three of which featured soft sand turns and obstacles within close proximity of a tight turn. Section four once again happened on the rock ridgeline below the parking area.

The drama started early when Chris Porter was caught drinking a Red Bull before the event, and was nearly disqualified for taking the competition half-seriously. He was later forgiven when the other competitors 1) made sure he enjoyed a frosty adult libation afterword, and 2) all agreed that he rides poorly anyway. Problem averted.

Tens of spectators turned out and were treated to an event-long battle between MooMoo Butler and The Hammer, with both riders trying to outdo each other in the sandy sections. All five competitors agreed that the sand turns were very challenging with a 14-inch tire-shod mini bike, with the two top riders using every trick/stunt they knew to get the elusive clean. Elwood Orton, Fearless Dugan and Brewtus Porter all settled for threes in the sand. When the competition reached the rock ridge (finally), Hammer and MoMoo were both gunning for the win, and trying to "outspectacular" each other, with Hammer emerging victorious. Brewtus, Elwood, and Fearless finished in that order.

Best ride of the event was awarded to Elwood for cleaning section three, set on the railroad tie practice area in the parking lot. The "ouch" award went to Fearless for tipping over in section two and landing with his right hand in a sticker bush. After righting the bike, he made it 5 feet before repeating the same stunt. What earned him the award was the fact that his gloves were jammed in his back pocket, protecting his backside.

An unprecedented amount of preparation went into the TY for this event. A three-inch dry-rot rip in the rear tire had the inner-tube bulging out, threatening to result in 5 DNF's. Four feet of silver duct-tape solved that dilemma, and looked very Rednecky to boot! There was also a mid-event exhaust-system repair using a 5lb sledgehammer and a 7mm wrench as a drift...

Several spectators have mentioned TY's in their garages, and the possibility of getting several of their mentally slow friends together

for additional teams. Once again, other teams are welcome!

The next event is scheduled for the afternoon of April 4th. Sand sections have already been voted out, so sections in the mouth of lower pool are being considered.
